

# Information for Camp Welfare Officers April 2025

Camp Welfare Officers are required for all trips abroad where Under 18s are present. The role of the Camp Welfare Officer may sometimes be undertaken by the Team Manager.

It is recommended the welfare officer is not one of the coaches or a spouse/partner of a coach; if the coach is the cause of concern athletes may feel unable to raise their concern. However, it is recognised this is not always possible. In consultation with other suitably qualified and vetted staff, the welfare officer may delegate some of these responsibilities.

A child is anyone who has not yet reached their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday. GB Snowsport has a moral and legal obligation to ensure that, when given responsibility for children, all coaches, camp welfare officers, managers, volunteers and anyone working on behalf of the organisation, we provide them with the highest possible standard of care. Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility the GBS Safeguarding Children Policy applies to everyone working or volunteering with U18s for GBS.

Many of our athletes will have attended training and race camps organised by other organisations and Academies, but it is imperative they know the standard of behaviour **GBS requires of them**, know their boundaries and know there is always someone they can talk to if they have any concerns about their welfare or training/competition.

#### All Camp Welfare Officers will be required to:

- Have an up to date Enhanced DBS disclosure with barred list check for working with children.
- Complete a Self-Declaration Form
- Provide the name of 2 referees, unless currently working within GBS. Referees must have known you for at least 2 years and at least one must be a professional reference.
- Attend appropriate safeguarding training. Recommended training is the UK Coach Safeguarding and Protecting Children. Training should be undertaken every 3 years, and suitable refresher training is SPC (as before), or the following online courses:
  - Safeguarding & Protecting Children UK Coaching
  - Child Protection in Sport and Active Leisure Online Training Course | EduCare
- Camp Welfare Officers who have attended alternative safeguarding training should contact the GBS Welfare Officer to see if it is acceptable.
- It is recommended Camp Welfare Officers have an up to date first aid certificate. If they do not have one, a coach/person with an up to date first aid certificate must be available even when athletes are not training/competing.
- It is recommended that Camp Welfare Officers have mental health awareness training. Mental Health Awareness for Sport and Physical Activity+ UK Coaching

### A welfare officer will be responsible for: (regarding all athletes under the age of 18)

- The care and welfare of the athletes when not training/competing.
- The health and safety of the athletes when not training/competing.





- Working in loco parentis for all young people, represent the needs of these young people where required.
- Ensuring they have travel details for all athletes (provided by GBS Office).
- Ensuring they know all medical conditions of athletes and treatment required (provided by GBS office).
- Ensuring they have relevant contact details for all parents/guardians for the duration of the camp; e.g. if the parents are away during the camp, they have their appropriate contact details (provided by GBS office).
- Ensuring they are aware of any restrictions regarding photographs or videoing of any athlete (provided by GBS office).
- Ensuring all athletes receive a welcome introduction including safeguarding briefing (see Induction for Athletes guidelines on page 3).
- Ensuring all athletes are aware of who to contact, and how to contact them, if they wish to raise a concern.
- Ensuring all concerns raised are dealt with appropriately and where relevant passed on to GBS Safeguarding and Welfare Officer.
- Ensuring athletes adhere to bed time and lights out requirements.
- Ensuring boys do not enter girls' bedrooms and girls do not enter boys' bedrooms.
- Ensuring where athletes aged over 18 are sharing with athletes aged under 18, the same rules apply regarding not letting athletes of the opposite gender in their bedrooms. NB: GBS Policy is that athletes aged under 18 do not share a room with athletes aged over 18. However, it is recognised in a mountain environment this is not always possible.
- Always ensuring 2 members of staff are present if they need to enter a bedroom of an athlete/athletes (unless it is an emergency)
- Ensuring (with coaches where appropriate) any accidents or injuries are recorded on an Accident Form and forwarded to GBS office, and parents are informed as appropriate.
- Ensuring (with coaches where appropriate) any incidents are recorded on a Safeguarding Incident form <u>Safeguarding Incident Report Form</u> and forwarded to the GBS Safeguarding and Welfare Officer.
- Where appropriate the Camp Welfare Officer should telephone the GBS Safeguarding and Welfare

- Abstaining from alcohol at all times whilst on the camp; In the event of an emergency you may need to drive or accompany an injured person for medical treatment.
- Ensuring that any recreational activities (e.g. swimming) must be competently supervised at all times.
- Encouraging athlete feedback and passing this on to the GBS Welfare Officer where appropriate (e.g. positive and negative comments about their experience of the camp, and any welfare issues).

Other scenarios and challenges will present themselves and it is up to the Camp Welfare Officer to act in loco parentis and use common sense to react to situations. E.g. ensuring the mini-bar in athletes' bedroom





is removed prior to athletes occupying rooms; liaising with other nations' coaches or camp welfare officers if behaviour of their athletes is affecting ours, etc.

Whilst Camp Welfare Officers are encouraged to get to know the athletes, they must at all times adhere to the GBS Safeguarding Children Policy and maintain professional boundaries.

Camp Welfare Officers are in a position of trust and as such must not have sexual relationships with anyone under the age of 18 in their care. Please also read the leaflet "Safeguarding in Snowsport – U18 Staff Guide".

## **Induction for Athletes (Under 18)**

### Induction to be carried out by Camp Welfare Officer or Camp Welfare Officer and Coach/other

- 1. Welcome athletes to the camp. Acknowledge that some athletes may have been away numerous times with us or other clubs/organisations, for others this may be the first time but for GBS camps all athletes are required to comply with **OUR** rules.
- 2. Ensure athletes know who is who, on the camp
  - a. Coaches and their role
  - b. Manager and their role
  - c. Camp Welfare Officer and their role. The role of the welfare officer is to ensure athletes are supported and have someone to talk to whilst away from their parents/guardians and be responsible for the health and safety of athletes whilst off the mountain. If anything is worrying them, or they are unhappy or concerned about anything talk to the welfare officer or other staff member if they prefer. Worries could include the training, racing/competition, coaches' expectations or behaviour, other athletes' behaviour towards them, feeling isolated or bullied etc. Whatever it is feel free to come and have a chat. GBS wants athletes to be happy and supported, which will help them do their best.
  - d. Ensuring staff know they must pass on any welfare or safeguarding concerns to the Camp WO, or GBS Welfare Officer.
  - e. - 3. Rules and expectations including:
  - a. Being ready on time and prepared for the activity.
  - b. Taking personal responsibility for themselves.
  - c. Listening to the coaches and doing as they are told (subject to it being a reasonable request).
  - d. Feeling free to challenge ideas but respecting other people's ideas.
  - e. Off the mountain, abiding by the rules regarding areas that are out of bounds.
  - f. Not going into the bedroom of someone of the opposite gender.





- g. Not letting someone of the opposite gender enter their bedroom (applies to over 18s too if sharing with under 18s).
- h. Not engaging in any form of sexual relationship whilst on the camp.
- i. Abiding by lights out curfew times.
- j. Not drinking, smoking, Vaping etc as in the Athlete's Code of Conduct.
- k. Making sure they treat other athletes well; not bullying them, or using mobile phones or social media in a way that may cause upset to others or bring GBS into disrepute.
- I. Remember you are representing GBS and Great Britain, be a good ambassador.
- 4. Reporting of Concerns: Ensure athletes know what to do if they are unhappy about anything report the concern to the camp welfare officer, coach or other adult.
- 5. At the end of the season GBS will be asking athletes for feedback. If you have any ideas during the camp to help improve things please let Camp Welfare Officer know.
